ONGOING COMMUNICATION

We will respond to your inquiries within 24 hours M-F. Should you need to contact your child or us during the school day, please call the front desk (231) 929-9325 for assistance as we will be engaged with the children during these hours. We will have scheduled conferences twice a year, you will sign up for a visit with your child to see their work, and you are welcome to observe in the classroom. Please reach out to me if you have any questions, concerns, or need to share anything affecting your child. It is easiest to send an email to schedule a time to talk. We are usually available daily between 11:25-11:55 while the learners are in PE and 1:15-2:45 on Monday's while they are in art and music.

Classroom Highlights are a way for us to share what we are learning about and discussing in the classroom with you all at home. New Classroom Highlights will be emailed to you and posted on our Teacher Page once a month.

SAFETY & WELLBEING

Your children's safety is of utmost importance to us. Although upper elementary children are some of the oldest in the school and are granted many more freedoms, our main concern is to always keep them safe, physically and emotionally. In this regard, please let us know either in person or in writing if someone other than you will be picking them up. Also, please make sure one of us (Jamie, DiAnn, or Betsy) acknowledges you if you need to pick them up during the school day so that we are aware that they are leaving with you. Please note that you will need to come to the classroom to pick up your child if they are leaving early.

WORK

School is your children's work. We expect them to come on time and be well rested and prepared. Our work cycle begins at 8:20. Students are able to enter the elementary door, sign in, and head outside starting at 8:00am without charging for early care. *This is a great way for them to wake up and start moving at the beginning of the day.* We will engage in learning in all subject areas and your children will practice lessons and research a variety of topics.

Please take this start time (8:20am) into consideration when planning your days. Because their work is important, we ask that you make your best effort to schedule appointments before or after school. Finally, because so much of your children's work is collaborative and group lessons are the norm, advance notice of vacations or other time away from school is greatly appreciated and allows us to plan accordingly.

HOMEWORK

With the possible exception of the 6th years' UN work, we do not anticipate sending homework home with your children. They have sufficient time to complete their responsibilities during the workday. We have spelling lessons, practice, and tests at school and your children will practice flash cards in our room. However, we do expect them to continue learning and engaging in "work at home." It is essential for their development to productively contribute to your family's daily activities, whether they walk the dog, care for a sibling, help prepare dinner, or wash the dishes. There is a great list in "How to Raise an Adult" by Julie Lythcott-Haims. Last, but certainly not least, we ask that you set aside ample time for reading every night. We also have an appendix of "Montessori Homework Ideas for the Upper Elementary" by John Snyder.

This is a wonderful opportunity for confidence building, public speaking, and trying something new!

SIXTH YEAR MMUN

Our sixth group of delegates will participate in the Montessori Model United Nations again this year. **We will travel to NYC February 18-22.** Participating in the MMUN is an emotional and intellectual commitment, so we will have regular meetings to support your children in their exploration of real world issues and the development of solutions for the same. It is possible that we may need to have before school and/or after school meetings. We welcome *all parent support* whether your child is a 6th year student or not. HUMAN GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

As your children enter their next stage of development, our goal is to prepare them as much as possible. Part of this preparation includes a safe and comfortable gathering to discuss how their bodies are changing as they approach puberty. In the spring, our students will meet with Carrie Ullery-Smith. She will candidly acknowledge physical changes that will occur, discuss practical aspects of dealing with these changes, and address peer and societal pressures that relate to this phase of life. **These lessons will occur in the first week of March.**

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Education

As an entire school we will be engaging in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion education. As a staff we read Tiffany Jewell's book, "This Book is Anti-Racist" and we highly encourage you to read it as a family at home or her book "Antiracist Kid." We also had an Implicit Bias training with Ester Triggs, Anti-Bias training with Britt Hawthorne in 2020, and Jamie attended the 2019 Montessori for Social Justice Conference, took a supporting children with trauma training in 2024 and will begin a Neurodivergent students in a Montessori classroom training this fall. We will be using Jewell's book "The Antiracist Kid: A Book About Identity, Justice, and Activism" as a guide for discussions and lessons alongside other resources. We will have group readings and journaling activities from this book and I will share what we learn in Classroom Highlights. This first week we talked about our identities.

Social and Emotional Learning

While academics are certainly a focus in the classroom, we also engage in social and emotional learning on a regular basis. We know that if children do not feel well mentally, they cannot engage in learning. We will use many book resources, have discussions, journal, use a "mood meter," and have meetings when needed. As a classroom we begin the first few days by coming up with an agreement about how we would like to feel in the community and what ways we can support those needs. Trisha Short supports the staff as our school counselor, and will visit our room once a month for social group lessons as well. I hope that you will reach out to me if your student needs more support in this area.

Birthdays

Your children are becoming more and more interested in close friendships and so our birthday celebrations happen with the help of two chosen friends of the birthday person. They will write a poem for their friend, everyone will share compliments, and the birthday person will blow out candles on or around their birthday or half birthday.

How to Raise an Adult Independence Suggestions:

Ages 6-7 is the beginning of basic cooking skills, putting things away, doing the dishes, and helping to pack their lunch, knowing address(es) and phone numbers

Ages 8-9 folding clothes, simple hand sewing, caring for outdoor toys, using a broom and dustpan properly, reading a recipe and preparing a simple meal, making a grocery list, counting and making change, watering and weeding, taking out the trash, and vacuuming

Ages 10-13 staying home alone, going to the store and making a purchase alone, changing the bedsheets, using the washing machine and dryer, planning and preparing a more complicated meal, using the oven, reading labels, ironing, using basic hand tools, mowing the lawn, and looking after younger siblings
